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

#### VILANOVA I LA GELTRÚ IN THE 1940s

The Civil War left Vilanova devastated after the bombings, with its population first heavily diminished and then severely repressed -just like the rest of Catalonia. Franco's regime ruled with an iron fist -imposing every single mayor, for example- and through at least all the decade its people were impoverished at all levels: food was rationed, electricity was restricted and industrial production was paralysed at the very least.

Regarding social life, the first years after the war were marked by the political repression, but also by the personal differences that were hidden under the disguise of political grievances -old personal issues were reported as if they were against the Regime. It took years to regain normality in such basic things as going for a walk, but eventually people found a way to keep up. It goes without saying that every minor political decision in town was made by the local sections of the fascist Regime, such as the Juventudes (the Party Youths) or the Sección Femenina (Women's Faction).

To sum up, the 1940s was one of the darkest periods in our history.

I am sure that you, just like me, will keep on swimming too. You just have to trust in yourself.





BOLERANY.

In local jaergon. a Bolerany is a whirlpool that appears near the coast in days of undertow combined with strong currents.

It is a highly dangerous phenomenon, and may result in death if unaware swimmers are swallowed.

BACKGROUND: With her mother dead at childbirth, she was naised by her father. On 6th February 1938. he died in the air raid and bombing of the Pirelli factory, where he was working as a machinist.


What you are facing is the church of Santa Maria de la Geltrú, which started being built in 1699 onto the ruins of an older one. Actually, it was so old it isn't known when it was built!

There are many things to see on the façade: a glass rose window, a figure of the Virgin, a pediment made of broken stones and, just above the door, some stones called voussoirs that look about to fall!

The route, however, does not begin here. If the façade is 12, go to the right, around 3 o'clock, and just on the corner you will find three plaques: two which are dedicated to Father Narcís Font and one with some dates.

Once you've found them, go to page 20.





World War I aviators marked positions with the hours of a clock, as if they were in the center of a clockwise hand and pointed to each hour.



Eleven o'clock!





The G clef ( ) precedes the treble notes. For example, in a piano score, it tells us what notes we need to play with our right hand.

The F clef (9:), on the other hand, precedes the bass notes: On a piano, it would be for the notes we would play with our left hand.

So, as treble notes are higher than the bass ones, it means you were wrong!

Hurry, go back to page **25**! You still have a lot to discover!





If you have found the figure of the Holy Christ, you will see that it is inside some kind of recess that is part of the house: it is called a niche and, like this one, has often got a lantern of its own. There are many in La Geltrú-let's see if you can find some more!

In this square you will also find four plaques with the names of the streets. You will have to go to number 3 in the square, where the dragon takes you, and read page **25** there.

Not the Morris Men, nor the craftsman: The Dragon of Vilanova!





Did you know?

When a niche houses a religious like this one, it is called a sigure like this one, it is called a chapel, because people used to stop there to pray.





# Did you know?

To your right is a huge stone in the corner, which protrudes. Do you know what it is called, and what it was used for?

It's called a corner guard, or wheel guard, because it protected the corners of houses from the wheels of carts (and sometimes they were even put in doors). There are some so big that can support the whole house!

On the very corner there is an iron hook which is apparently there for hanging something.

Indeed, there used to be a lamp. And you know what? Lamps used to run on gas!

Every evening the lamplighter would turn on the gas, approach a flame and light the streets; and every morning he would turn them off. As a memorial, Carrer del Fanaler (Lamplighter St) is very close by.

On the plaque on this same house you will see the name of the street and the image of a popular dance:

If the plaque shows peasants dancing around a pole, turn left and look for number *5acco*, and read page **28** there.

If the plaque shows people dancing with tambourines, turn right and go to number 15, and read page 24 there.





This house hides several things. To begin with, it has a double numbering: it is no. 16 now, but also used to be no. 53 of the old street that surrounded the church (which is now divided into three different streets).

A couple of houses above, there are some round arched iron doors: this is the back door of the Peixateria Vella, the fish market of the old Vilanova. This used to be no. 14 on the street, but one of the cyphers has been lost...

If the remaining cypher is 1, go around the building and read page 29.

If the remaining cypher is 4, go to no. 8 on this same street and read page 32 there.




Vegetable Market at Plaça de les Cols (Cabbage Sq.)



Did you know?

In Vilanova, before the Market was built, there were several squares where the different products were where the different products were sold: Plaça de les Cols (Cabbage sold: Plaça de la Gallina (Poultry Square), Plaça de la Gallina (Poultry Square)... and Plaça Peiseateria (Fishmongers Square), close to where we are now.





What you are seeing is the remains of an ancient press. The side supports and the wooden crossbar are long gone, as well as the press itself, but we can get an idea of what it used to be like.

Now walk along Carrer Arengaders up to no. 8, and read page 15 when you get there.





You are in Plaça de l'Assumpció, where the church of La Geltrú is located.

But... can't you see you started here? Or maybe you want to do the whole route again?

If you liked the route so much that you want to start over, go to page 1.

If you want to continue what you were doing before, and redo the count, go back to page 21.

The square's so beautiful when the kids fill it with their games and laughter...

You are on Carrer de l'Argenteria (Silversmiths St). Silversmiths were the craftsmen who worked silver, that is to say, the jewellers of the Middle Ages.

You must be facing the door of the Fonda (an inn), which has a date above the door.

If you add up the cyphers of the date and the result is an even number, turn right, walk up the street until number 8, and read page 23 there.

If the addition of the cyphers of the date is an odd number, turn left and walk to the corner down the street, and read page 18 there.




You were wrong!

Didn't I tell you it was a flat, doorless street? Didn't you have to go downstairs?

Don't you see that if you turn right you walk out of the wall and, therefore, from La Geltrú?

Hurry, go back to page 30 and pay more attention!





La Mulassa (The Mule) during Festa Major, just before being lost during the outbreak of the Civil War.

Did you know?

Josep Mascaró was the mayor of Vilanova i la Geltrú in 1809, during the French War.

He had been born in La Geltrú.

You have already seen that many of the plaques on the streets of La Geltrú have motifs of Festa Major (the Patron saint festivities). Here is the Mulassa (the mule), probably the most charismatic element of all: the one that can be seen now has been recovered in 1947, after the Civil War, but it is known that there was already one in Vilanova as early as in 1628! Even La Geltrú has one of its own ...

Walk along Carrer la Muralla -which has a devil on the plaque- until the next corner and then go to page *30*.





Look at the stones above the door - this is something you will have to do many times to solve this route!

If you look closely, you will see a sardine and a number: 1701. This is the year the house was built! You can also read Ave Maria (Hail Mary in Latin): this protected the house, and that's why many people had it carved on their houses.

Walk down the street and look for a house from 1703 on the left, one with a mountain range: this house is protected by the Virgin of Montserrat!

From here, look at the street on the right: if it bears the name of a king, enter it and go to page 33.

If it bears the name of a business, walk down the street until next corner and go to page 31.





There's a new symbol above every door... such hard work to catalogue them all!



Congratulations! You have completed the route by choosing Font i Gumà.

Josep Font i Gumà was an architect from Vilanova who was responsible, among other things, of restoring the Geltrú Castle (which is why this square is named after him) or for the expansion of the Víctor Balaguer Library-Museum in 1919.



I'll use the Foda Archives on page 36 to translate the hieroglyphs!

If you look at the other plaque in the square, you will see some symbols related to architecture... and Freemasonry! Another secret? Maybe he expanded the Museum so it could house more secrets?

Here you've got one more secret: collect and draw the hieroglyphs on pages 1, 7, 24 and 26 -in order, and in the first box. If you translate the hieroglyphics you'll get a 4-letter word. Then go to page 35 and perhaps you'll be able to unsolve the mystery...

I haven't been able to... yet.




Look closely at the voussoirs of the door of the house: what intertwined symbols there are!

You must already know the most visible one: the intertwined A and M say that the house is protected by the Virgin Mary (Ave Maria). But... it has other symbols! Are they runes? Are they spells? Are they elder signs? I'm afraid not: they are simply the initials of the owners of the house that had it built.

Draw your initials in the same style here, and when you're done, walk to no. 4 on this same street and read page 4 there.

Did you know?

This street is dedicated to archbishop armanya, born very close. That is why the plaque bears a crosier (the staff) and a miter (the hat).

The Morris Men have taken you this far, and you'll have to follow the Morris Men! Follow the street that has this dance on the plaque and turn right at the very first corner: hidden, on the left hand side, there is a very large wooden door.

When you get there, go to page 21.

A statue of Archbishop Armanyà, sculpted by Manuel Fuxà in 1887,

Stands at the door of the Biblioteca-Museu Victor Balaguer.




Look at that beautiful plaque! I started drawing it, but I forgot something and I can't remember exactly what it was...

And did you notice? There isn't a single Roman around! The press was not Roman, but obviously neither are you!

That's because you got the Roman numerals wrong! Look at the chart with the Roman numerals and go back to the plaque with the dates, and to page 20!

#### **ENCICLO**



Hackberry (celtis australis): tree of the cannabaceae family, very common in the Mediterranean area. Its resistant and elastic wood made it ideal to make agricultural tools, musical instruments and religious images.

Did you know?

Plaça Sledoners has also been known as Plaça del Pou (Well Sq., during the Middle Ages) and as Plaça del 14 d'Abril (during the Second Republic), but its popular name is Plaça de Sant Cristòfol (St Christopher), probably due to the image above number 7.

You are in Plaça Lledoners (Hackberry Sq.), which is called so after its trees (although it has more honeycombs).

The square is packed with remarkable elements: for example, above the door of number 7 there is a bull by Archbishop Armanyà -who you will see how important he is- and a graffiti which reads *OFI\_al* -which you should know what it means by now.

There is also a curious fact: the square has a series of house numbers that are doubled -and that's why it reads "bis". All you have to do is go from 9 to 9bis and continue in the same direction until the first corner. Then go to page 16BIS.





And let's go on!



Congratulations! You have completed the route by choosing **Archbishop Armanyà**.

Francesc Armanyà i Font was born in 1718 in the house you are facing, and became Archbishop of Tarragona.

Among many other things, he promoted education for all, created free public schools, and was a great advocate of the ideas of the Enlightenment: he was a man of both faith and reason!



I'll use the Foda Archives on page 36 to translate the hieroglyphs!

When he died, in 1803, many claimed he was a saint, and Víctor Balaguer placed a statue of him on the door of his Museum! What could his secret be?

Here you've got one more secret: collect and draw the hieroglyphs on pages 5, 25, 29 and 33 -in order, and in the first box. If you translate the hieroglyphics you'll get a 4-letter word. Then go to page 35 and perhaps you'll be able to unsolve the mystery...



You are on Pujada del Cinto, and if you look carefully at the house on number 10, you will see an Indiano house: this means that it was built in the 19th century by a man who made his fortune in the Indies (that is, in America). Well, in this case he had an old 18th century house restored, but he gave it that look and, above all, he had these protruding windows built, which are called niches... but I'll tell you what they are some other time.

Why don't I tell you now?

Because you got it wrong! Hurry! Run back to the inn and to page 8!

Carrer Unió was still a torrent in this map: Forrent de la Pastera!

You are on Pujada del Cinto, a steep rise named so after Jacint Fontanals, a gentleman from La Geltrú who promoted the construction of a bridge that connected the end of this street with Vilanova, saving the torrent of La Pastera (today Carrer Unió).

But what? It's not a steep rise, but a steep fall?

If you see it going down it's because you got it wrong!

Go back to page 16, fast!







Please notice there is a corner plaque commemorating the placement of the street name tiles.

At the bottom there is a date... but it's written in Roman numerals!


If the year is 1968, walk up the street to the gardens and turn left: on the floor, attached to the wall, there is a stone that looks like a small bathtub. When you get there, read page 6.

If the year is 1973, turn right at the gardens, all around the block on your right, until you find two black fountains. When you get there, go to page 27.



Did you know?

The name plates of the streets and squares of La Geltrii are made with black tiles. There are made with black tiles. You are at the south side door of the church, above the steps.

The craftsmen of the time, as you can see, used a lot of iron nails for the door!

If they used more than 100, continue down the street until you reach the square, and go to page 7.

If they used less than 100, go back to the street where you come from, turn right to number 16 and go to page 5.





The first documented reference to the church is from 1128, but this just means it was there before. Its most representative element is the baroque polychrome wooden altarpiece, dated back to 1643




When the Geltrú Castle was restored, it was decorated with stones from old houses in Barcelona that had been demolished to open Via Laietana. They also used this figure of the Nin (a boy), apparently from one of the houses that belonged to the Nin family in Vilanova. What do you think he is looking at?

Look carefully at what the Nin is looking at: he is looking at a date hidden between two suns. Once you've found it, write it down, sit on the church stairs, and go to page *34*.





During the Guerra del Francès (Spanish War of Independence, 1808-1814), many military personnel were housed in private homes, and the doors marked the rank of the soldier stationed there... in case you needed him!



But there are not only military elements in La Geltrú; there are also many religious ones. Many houses have the protection symbol of Mother Mary (an A and an M intertwined over the door), and some even have religious figures on the façade, some with a lantern!

Follow the street to the Plaça del Sagrat del Cor (Sacred Heart Sq.) and look for the Holy Christ. Once you've found Him, go to page 3.

Can you deduce what ranks were these officers?

Here, on number 15, there has been a restaurant called L'Arengada for many years.

But... do you know what an Arengada is? An arengada is a bloater, that is to say, a smoked herring.

So... let's say your mistake is so big you could say it's bloated! (if you allow me the pun).

You shouldn't be here. So, go back quickly to page 4 and retake the thread!






Did you know?

Carrer dels Ferrissaires (Potter St) was called Confucius Street between 1936 and 1939!





Happy birthday to me ...

Look at the window railings in this house: they are music scores! This must be a musician's house!

The details that decorate the railings are musical notes, and they are preceded by symbols that tell us if the notes are treble or bass.

If the railing with the G clef (6) is placed highest, continue walking down the street until the square, and go to page 16 there.

If on the other hand the railing with the F clef (9:) is placed highest, go back to Sacred Heart Square, sit on the bench and go to page 2.



You are in Plaça del Pou (Well Sq), and the fountain here belongs to the first running water circuit in Vilanova built back in 1861 (the other similar fountain remaining is that in Plaça Miró de Montgròs). This one is dedicated to Archbishop Armanyà, a name we have seen before. It would seem everything is connected... if it weren't for one small detail: You left La Geltrú! When you crossed the street, you crossed Carrer Unió, which covers the torrent that separated the old medieval terms of Cubelles and La Geltrú.

Hurry, go back to the house where you come from -and to page 32-, but first look at the iron plate on the ground just where Carrer del Pont (Bridge St) begins, and you will see a very old map of Vilanova i la Geltrú in 1500!










Everybody used to come to fetch water at Font Xica!

These fountains replace an older one that was just here years ago (La Font Xica - there used to be many fountains everywhere!).

From here you must be facing a very old house with huge naked buttresses (with no concrete or plaster or anything on the stones) on either side. Walk along the street with two buttresses -not one!- and walk to the house in no. 1, and read page 11 there.





Acco, in this case, does not refer to the chief in the Gaul who faced Julius Caesar (does that remind you of a comic book?). It neither refers to the Air Conditioning Constructors of Ohio...

Acco is the abbreviation for "accessory" or "access", referring to an entrance that was not the main one in the building.

If you walk to your left, you will see some tiles with a music score on the wall: right here, on this street, the Vilanova Ball de Bastons (Morris Men) was recovered, and right here the -then- young members of the group used to rehearse!

Can you whistle the music? Can you dance it?

When you think you're done, walk along the street until its end and go to page 14 there.






You are just in front of the façade of the Peixateria, the Fish Market... but... seriously? Can't you really tell a number 1 from a number 4? You made a big mistake, didn't you?

Quickly, go back to the back door of the Peixateria, where you come from, and to page 5.

And pay more attention next time!



Layout and Elevation of the Peixateria!






The street you are on is called La Muralla (Wall St) because it follows the old wall that surrounded La Geltrú (that's why it has such a strange shape!). Moreover, you are roughly where the old Gate used to be: here started the road to the lagoon where the fishermen of La Geltrú used to catch their fish (now drained and covered by the Railway Branch).

Now look around and enter the flat street with no doors.

If you decided to turn left, walk to number 13 and read page 13 there.

If you decided to turn right, walk down the stairs and there go to page 9.

You are on Carrer Bonaire (Bonaire Street), which is not called so after the Dutch isles in the Caribbean but because it led to the old hermitage of the Virgin of Bonaire (Good Breeze), the Patron Saint of fishermen. This means that there used to be fishermen in La Geltrú: it was not just a farming village during the Middle Ages!

I hope though that there is some good breeze to clear up your mind... as you did it wrong! The street you had to enter was Jaume I! Hurry, go back to the corner you come from and to page 11!




At the door of number 8, which is now a restaurant, there are a few mysteries... and other things that no longer are: you must know by now, for example, what's the use of what is engraved above the door.

You need to look at the bottom part of the balcony. It is made of tan and green tiles on iron brackets, and it is the tiles what will help you go on.

If there are exactly as many green triangles as tan ones, go to the square on your right and look for the Nin (a child with one hand raised and one on the waist), and read page 22 there.

If, on the other hand, there are more green triangles than tan ones, keep walking, take the first street on the left, walk to the white stone fountain and read page 26 there.

Did you know?

Jaume I adopted the figure of the bat in his helmet because, according to legend, a bat perched on his tent woke everyone up just on the verge of a Muslim attack.

Jaume I is buried in the Monastery of Poblet.

You are on Jaume I Street, Catalan king of the thirteenth century known as The Conqueror. He conquered back Mallorca and Valencia, which until then had been ruled by the Muslims.

On this street there are two tasks you'll have to do: first, go to number 3 and pay close attention to the door handle. Is it a duck? Is it a dragon? Draw it below!

When finished, continue walking until the end of the street and go to page 8.



We are so close to the end... but it is time for you to choose which end.

If you look at the façade right opposite, there are two very characteristic plates. Choose one and go to the page that marks each one of these items.

If you have chosen the Font i Gumà plaque, go to page 12.

If you have chosen the plaque with the text of the birthplace of Archbishop Armanyà, go to page 17.

Toda was a genius with hieroglyphs... let's see if you match him. What's the name of the Egyptian God you translated?


Is it *Osiris*, the God of Agriculture and Religion?
